CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

In the faculties of Science and Arts, the annual evaluation system (1+1+1) is being followed. A midterm examination is also held. However, in the faculty of Commerce, the University of Calcutta has recommended the introduction of the CBCS system as per UGC's recommendation. Subsequently, this system has been introduced in the faculty of Commerce in the academic year 2017-18. The syllabus of the CBCS system is largely different from the syllabus of the earlier annual evaluation system (1+1+1). Our college has geared itself towards ably carrying out all the recommendations of the university. In the college, a modified routine was framed keeping in mind the new university regulations regarding the department of Commerce. Our college starts at 10.30 AM and gets over at 5.30 PM. The college hours are designed in an effort to accommodate the required number of classes. The attendance of the students in each class is recorded in the attendance register. The record of the attendance of the students is also submitted to the university online. Subsequently, hard copies of the above-mentioned documents are submitted to the university. The syllabus is evenly distributed among the teachers of each department. The number of classes in each paper is determined keeping in mind the requisite credit hours. Students work on topics allotted to them and submit projects in the faculty of commerce. Group discussions, viva voce and power-point presentations are also a part of the evaluation process. The project files submitted by the students record the project work done by them. In the department of Commerce, the marks obtained by the students in the internal assessment, tutorial and practical examination are submitted to the university online. An academic calendar is

provided by the university to the college. Based on the academic calendar of the university the college also designs its customized institutional calendar. The syllabus in each subject is designed by a Board of Studies of the university and provided to the college. Based on the syllabus provided by the university, syllabus distribution is undertaken, and the teachers prepare to teach plans. The teaching plans are followed by the teachers throughout the academic year, and this helps them to complete their syllabus on time.

Three different categories of examinations are held in the college for BA and B.Sc courses namely, class tests, midterm examinations and preparatory tests. Regular class tests are held in all the departments. Midterm and preparatory test questions are set as per University norms in order to acquaint the students with the question pattern followed by the University. For B.Com courses internal and theoretical examinations are taken as per university CBCS norms Answer scripts of all college internal exams are evaluated by the teachers following the University norms. Final University answer scripts are evaluated under a system operated directly by the university of Calcutta. However, in some cases e.g. Project work of Commerce students, practical papers of science students and language papers of all students evaluation is carried out by the faculty members themselves jointly with external CU nominated examiners.

The college runs a completely online admission process which is constantly monitored by an active admission committee. All departments are involved in the process by framing respective admission norms. All actions are taken with the prior knowledge and permission of the Governing Body.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The Library of JCC College has many text and reference books as well as journal/periodical subscriptions. The library includes an OPAC system that allows to search the catalogue and find what a stakeholder is looking for. The library contains a high-speed internet connection and a Photocopying machine. There is also a separate Digital Library Section with 6 systems. Registers are kept at the entry to make it easier for pupils to go in and make the book access simple and easier. Every student has a library membership card, and pupils are encouraged to use it. Every day, the library guarantees that all newspapers are available. The library committee oversees the acquisition of appropriate books and e-journals for the library.

Curriculum Development

Calcutta University has a board of studies for undergraduate colleges. The curriculum is formulated by them, which has to be followed by all affiliated colleges. However, faculties of different departments of our college participate in the curriculum formulation process by attending workshops and exchanging opinions.

Teaching and Learning

Answer scripts of all college internal exams are evaluated by the teachers on regular basis following the University norms. Final University answer scripts are evaluated by faculty members of other colleges as per University norms. However, in some cases e.g. Project work of Commerce students, project work for Environmental Science, practical papers of science students and language papers of all students evaluation is carried out by the faculty members themselves (either partly or fully). 3. Parent-teacher meetings (PTM) are held department-wise after the publication of the examination results, where guardians are apprised of their wards progress. Guidance is provided to the students to enable them to improve their performance
